

The world's highest cricket ground is in **Chail, Himachal Pradesh**. It was built in 1893 after levelling a hilltop. This cricket pitch is 2,444 metres above sea level.

The **Baily Bridge** is the highest bridge in the world. It is located in the Ladakh valley between the Dras and Suru rivers in the Himalayan Mountains. It was built by the Indian Army in 1982.

The **Femur (thigh bone)** is the longest, heaviest and the strongest bone in the human body. Its length is 26 percent of the person's height.






About 80 percent of the **brain is water**. Living brain tissue is a pink,
